TWENTY SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (A)

In the Gospel last Sunday we heard Peter's profession of faith in the Lord. Under divine inspiration, Peter declared, 'You are the Christ, the Son of the living God', and Jesus confirms Peter as the rock. Today we see a more human side to Peter. When he hears that Jesus is to suffer, he responds in a very human way, 'Heaven preserve you, Lord; this must not happen.' Jesus rebukes Peter very strongly, saying, 'get behind me, Satan!' Last week, Peter was called the rock; now he is an obstacle, literally a stumbling stone. What is different?

On a human level, there is nothing wrong with what Peter has said – no one wants to see his friend tortured and killed. Our Lord actually agrees, which is why He rebukes Peter for tempting Him. Jesus in His human nature naturally recoiled from the events He knew were coming – we see this in the garden of Gethsemane, when He prays, 'My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; nevertheless let your will be done.' In God's plan, suffering has value. In fact, our redemption depends on it. We were redeemed through the cross of Christ, and our own Christian lives require us to face and carry our own crosses.

This is not easy, because the natural tendency is, like Peter, to try and avoid the cross. When we suffer, e.g. due to sickness, failures, disappointment or bereavement – we are not in control of events – and this is uncomfortable. But all these things are the crosses that Our Lord invites us to carry. It is very difficult, but through suffering we realise our shortcomings and limitations and ultimately our dependence on God.

The idea that suffering could have value is anathema to the world, which will not tolerate even minor discomfort or inconvenience. But our crosses give meaning to our lives – they are particular to us and they are the means we have of following Christ. Jesus says we cannot be His disciples unless we carry our crosses behind Him.

Jeremiah in the first reading describes the personal cost of following the will of God – he is mocked and ridiculed, and yet he continues to speak out as he is burning with love for God. In a similar way, many Christians are, at this time, being persecuted and killed for the same conviction. Here in the west, are we willing even to be laughed at for our faith? If we do not face rejection at some point, are we really living the Catholic faith, or is it so hidden that we cannot influence anything?

When we embrace the cross of suffering, and try to find the Lord in it, we are doing what St Paul says in the second reading, 'offering our bodies as a living sacrifice.' St Paul tells us, 'do not model yourselves on the behaviour of the world around you.' He exhorts us to think like Christ, and to accept with patience the sufferings and difficulties that come our way.

Our sufferings identify us with Christ. He wants us to unite our sufferings with His. In doing this, our crosses become means of sanctification for us. The cross is not an end in itself, but there can be no glory without it. If we want to progress spiritually, we must take up our cross, whatever it is. Then we will truly be His disciples.
